2020 Pop-Up Tent Guidelines

Pop-Up tents are only permitted on the day of show and sale. Tents are to be taken down completely each night. Any tent left behind will be confiscated. Tents are encouraged for exhibitors in show-and-go shows and exhibitors needing space to groom animal on day of show / sale only.

No saving of spots with downed tents, chairs, tables, coolers or other objects.

Tents are only permitted to be placed in identified spaces and may be no larger than a 10' X 10' pop-up style tent. Spaces will be 12' X 12' to allow for proper social distancing. Aisles will be wide enough between each row of tents to allow for EMS / Fire to safely reach someone in need.

Tents are NOT an area for gathering, and no groups larger than 10 people are permitted to use a single tent.

Signage will be in place to remind staff, exhibitors, and visitors to practice social distancing, wear cloth face coverings in public spaces - especially when maintaining at least 6 feet apart may be difficult, wash their hands, and follow other safety measures.

Sanitization stations will be scattered throughout the small animal barn and B. Carr Family Pavilion with signage advising of proper usage.

In pop-up tent areas, all individuals must wear facial coverings due to the inability to maintain 6 feet and follow proper social distancing guidelines in accordance with Ohio Facial Covering mandate.

Ohio Facial Covering Mandate:

- At an indoor location that is not a residence; outdoors, but unable to maintain six-foot social distance from people who are not household members; waiting for, riding, driving, or operating public transportation, such as a taxi, a car service, or a private car used for ride-sharing.

The order only requires those 10 years old or older to wear a mask (Ohio 4-H requires facial coverings for all 4-H members, regardless of age). Additional exclusions include:

- Those with a medical condition or a disability or those communicating with someone with a disability; those who are actively exercising or playing sports; those who are officiants at religious services; those who are actively involved in public safety; or those who are actively eating or drinking.
